President's Report

Time flies and 2006 have only a few more months to go. You may agree with me that one of the highlights of the year was the World Cup Soccer Tournament. As a special event the Academy organised a Watching-the Finals' evening for Fellows and families at the Fellows' Lounge lasting throughout the night.

Amidst all these excitements, the business of the College was as usual. A total of nine Council meetings were held since the last AGM in November 2005. Apart from dealing with the trainings, accreditation and examinations of the various specialties there are a few important issues, which I would like to report to you.

The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed between the Academy of Medicine and the Ministry of Health on 14 April marking the beginning of collaboration between the Ministry and the Academy and its various Colleges in the establishment of specialist trainings and registration in the Mainland. The Deputy Minister of Health, Professor Huang Jie-fu and his delegates visited Hong Kong again on 1 August to discuss on details of the collaboration. For a long time, The College has very close relationships with our counterparts in Mainland. It is our policy to continue the collaboration for the benefit of dental specialist trainings and services on both sides. I represented the College in the Opening Ceremony of the FDI World Dental Congress organised by the Chinese Stomatological Association (CSA) and held in Shenzhen on 22 September. I also attended Annual meeting of the CSA held in Shenzhen on 26 September.

As you may know, the Dentists Registration (Amendment) Bill was finally passed by the Legislative Council with the amended Ordinance gazetted on 26 May and scheduled to come into operation on 9 October. The major amendments involve the establishment of Education and Accreditation Committee (EAC) and the setting up of a Specialist Register (SR). The College Council has decided to nominate Dr William C W Yung, the current Censor-in-Chief to sit in the EAC of the Dental Council of Hong Kong. This was endorsed by the Academy and passed on to the Dental Council for consideration. With the setting up of the SR, permission to use the specialist titles under the old scheme would have lapsed. Nevertheless those of you who have obtained permission prior to the commencement date could have elected to have your name automatically included in the SR.

As one of the objectives of the College is to promote training and advancement of knowledge in Dental Surgery and not just dental specialists, the College Council recognised the need to provide an academic home for the dental colleagues in general practice. A Task Force on General Dental Practice (GDP) was formed with representatives from the HKDA, the Faculty of Dentistry, The University of Hong Kong and the Government Dental Service to look into the way forward and advise the Council.

October would become the busiest month of the year. With the closing ceremony of the Quincentenary of the RCSEd to be held in Hong Kong on 13 October, it would be an opportunity for most of the conjoint intermediate and probably some exit examinations to be held around this time. The College participates in the Conjoint Scientific Congress of RCSEd and College of Surgeons of Hong Kong (CSHK) and a 1-day dental symposium titled 'Changing Faces and Smiles' will be held on Wednesday, 11 October.

A Conjoint Conferment Ceremony will be held on 12 October together with RCSEd, CSHK, and College of Orthopaedic Surgery. The Council has decided to confer Honorary Fellowship to Professor Wang Xing, President of the Chinese Stomatological Association in recognition of his contributions and achievements in Dentistry both in China and abroad. Apart from this, 3 Fellows and 8 members will also receive their diploma. The Council decided not to hold the Annual Dinner separately but Fellows are urged to join the dinner after this ceremony.

This year's AGM of the College will be held on 11 October after the dental symposium. Four new Councillors will be elected. My special thanks to Professor Urban Hagg and Dr K Y Zee as they will leave the Council. I would like to extend my deepest appreciation to all members of the Council, specialty boards and various committees for their dedicated and hard work over the past year. Ada and Ling should also be thanked for ensuring the efficient running of the College activities. Finally it is my privilege and honour to serve as President during 2006 and I would like to thank all fellows and members for their continuous support.



Exit assessment and admission of second batch of Family Dentistry fellows

Eight candidates took part in the second diet of Family Dentistry exit assessment. Dissertations were scrutinized on 1st February 2005 and viva exam was carried out on 3rd February 2005. Five candidates passed and were conferred the College Fellowship on 20th November 2005.

First year training started in September 2004 with seven trainees. Three of them withdrew while the other four took the assessment on 6th July 2005. Three candidates passed. The failed candidate proceeded into second year training pending reassessment. Two first year trainees proceeded into second year training. Two more dentists joined the pathway in second year training as they were exempted from first year. One trainee withdrew in May 2006.

One candidate sat for the Conjoint MGDS Part I Examination in 2004 and was successful. There was no candidate in 2005. One candidate will be taking the Conjoint MGDS Part II Examination in October 2006.

- The fourth diet of the Exit examination was held on 14th & 17th November, 2005. A total of 4 candidates participated in the examination. Professor Klaus W Gratz from Zurich was appointed to be the external examiner. Dr Raymond L K Chow & Dr C T Lok were s uccessful in passing the examination. Following the successful experience in the introduction of external examiner in the third & fourth diets, the Specialty Board is in favour of this appointment to enhance & benchmark our standard of specialist accreditation in oral & maxillofacial surgery with other international centres.
- The Exit & Conjoint examinations will be held in October 2006 to make full utilization of the delegates from the Conjoint Scientific Congress. Dr I Ormiston is appointed as the external examiner for both examinations, whilst Professor J Shepherd & Dr P Douglas for the Conjoint examination. A total of nine candidates have applied to sit for the Conjoint MOS examination with six of them from overseas. A testimony that our College & specialty are building up our reputation as a regional centre of excellence in oral & maxillofacial surgery.

- This year's Conjoint MRD examination will be held in October in synchronization with the Quincentenary Celebration of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Edinburgh.

Dr Joseph Chan, who has been appointed as the Chairman of the Education Committee, has become the ex-officio member of our CME Subcommittee, commencing January 2006.

Dr Michael Tsang became the new member of the CME Subcommittee after formally approved by the College Council, effective from April 2006.

2. Synchronized CME/CPD Cycles commencing January 1, 2005:

All Fellows of our Academy have started the same new 3 years CME/CPD cycle from January 1, 2005 to December 31, 2007, Fellows of our College followed the same arrangement.

New Fellows, who are admitted any time within this CME/CPD cycle, will have the same obligation to fulfil the Academy's CME requirement, but their CME/CPD points will be adjusted on a pro-rata basis. For example, if a Fellow is admitted in November, 2006, he/she will start the CME/CPD cycle in January 1, 2007 and the cycle will still end in December 31, 2007. The target CME/CPD points will be 30 (adjusted to that for 1 year).

3. CME/CPD activities for the first 20 months of the current CME/CPD cycle:

Since January 1, 2005 and up to the end of August, 2006, our CME Subcommittee has vetted, pre-approved, endorsed and accredited a total of 1,303 scientific meetings, held in local or overseas.

4. Synchronized CME/CPD Cycles commencing January 1, 2005:

Currently we have a total of 193 Fellows in our College who require to fulfil the Academy's CME/CPD requirement. Since January 1, 2005, all these Fellows were grouped under the same batch and started the same CME/CPD cycle afresh. For the first 20 months of the current CME/CPD cycle (with cut off date on August 31, 2006), the CME/CPD record of our Fellows is tabulated as follow:

This report also serves to remind those Fellows who have the habit to submit CME/CPD claims only towards the end of the CME/CPD cycle. By that time, if some of the CME/CPD activities attended were not pre-approved by the College, they could only be counted under **Category C**, and the maximum number of CME/CPD points under this category could only be **10 points per** cycle. Under such circumstance, these Fellows might have difficulty in meeting the Academy's CME/CPD requirement, and there is very little our CME Subcommittee could do to help.

5. Review of the Dental Council of Hong Kong's voluntary Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Programme for Practising Dentists in Hong Kong:

This new Programme was commenced on July 1, 2005. The enrolees were required to pay an administrative fee to the administrator. A total of 10 enrolees selected our College as their administrator.

The CPD requirement for each enrolee is 15 CPD points per year, or a total of 45 CPD points per 3-year cycle.

The profiles of their CME scores at the end of the first year in the current cycle ending on June 30, 2006 are tabulated in the following table:

The Dental Council of Hong Kong (DCHK) has already approved all our Fellows to use the CPD-certified title, as long as they could fulfil the HKAM CME/CPD requirement at the end of the CME/CPD cycle. All Fellows do not need to register in the DCHK programme.

6. Pre-approved list of overseas dental meetings and review of the existing pre-approved list of organizations:

Due to the change in the CME/CPD Principle and Guidelines, all overseas dental meetings if not applied for pre-approval, the CME/CPD points will be accredited as Category C. In order to make it more convenient to the Fellows, the Council requested the Subcommittee to compile a list of pre-approved overseas dental meetings.

Specialty Boards have been consulted and suggested various overseas dental meetings for consideration. The Subcommittee consolidated a list and submitted to Council for approval. Once such a list is finalized, Fellows will no longer need to have pre-approval before they attend those meetings in order to accredit the CME/CPD points into Category A.

A list of pre-approved local organizations was included in the College CME/CPD Principle and Guidelines for some time. However, it has been brought to attention that some of these local organizations may not be active. The Subcommittee recently requested all the listed local organizations to submit an updated certificate of registration of their organization with the Hong Kong Police Force (which is a requirement by law in Hong Kong) and an account of CME/CPD activities in recent year. The Subcommittee will assess whether their pre-approved status could be granted based on the information received.

Scientific Meetings Committee

The Scientific Meetings Committee is pleased to report that two scientific meetings had been successfully held in the year 2005-2006.

The first one is the 2005 Winter Scientific Meeting held on 20 November 2005 in the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Building. The main theme of the scientific program was "Evidence-based Clinical Practice". The overseas invited speakers were Professor Malcolm Harris, Professor Fraser McCord and Professor W P Saunders. This meeting was attended by over 150 participants.

The second one is the 2006 Spring Scientific Meeting held on 21 May, 2006. The title of the scientific programme was "Implant Treatment in Difficult Cases". Professor Richard Palmer and Dr Leslie Howe from the King's College, London gave a one-day course in the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Building. There were 157 registered participants at the lectures.

I represented the College of Dental Surgeons as a member of the Scientific Programme Committee of the 2006 RCSED/CSHK Conjoint Scientific Meeting which marks the conclusion of a year-long celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh to be held in Hong Kong in October 2006. The College has been allocated a one-day dental symposium on Wednesday, 11 October 2006. The overseas and local invited speakers are Dr Vincent Bissell, Dr David Birnie, Professor L K Cheung, Dr T K Chow, Dr T W Chow, Dr Frederick Chu, Professor Urban Hagg, Dr Ian Ormiston, Professor Jonathan Shepherd and Dr W M Tsang.

I would like to thank all the members of the Scientific Meetings Committee nominated by the various specialty boards of the College for their contributions. Special thanks go to Miss Ada Houn and Miss Ling Chow for their indispensable assistance in organizing the above scientific meetings.

Treasurer's Report

The College recorded a modest deficit of HK\$94,382 in the Financial Statement for the year ended 31st March 2005. Membership and annual subscription fees remained to be the principle and stable source of revenue. The income derived from the Exit Examinations and Assessments in 2005 was reduced significantly as a result of the fluctuated number of candidates. The surplus derived from scientific meetings continued to contribute but was also reduced in comparison with the previous two years. The Council adopted a conservative policy with respect to our investment and the interest return was nominal.

On the expenditure side, the management fee and salary and allowances were the major operating expenses. There were salary increases for our staff since September 2005. The function expenses had increased significantly this year as sponsorships were granted to delegates attending the Quincentenary ceremony of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh in June 2005. The hosting of Conjoint Examinations with the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh annually was the major event of the College. The greater part of expenditure was derived from the examiners traveling from overseas and had incurred a modest deficit this year.

The accumulated fund of the College has reached 2.65 million.

On behalf of the College, I would like to convey my sincere gratitude to our Honorary Auditor, Mr. Li Ka Cheung, Eric of Messrs Li, Tang, Chen & Co. for his indispensable professional advice and services in the past year. Mr. Li has kindly offered himself for reappointment. Special thanks are due to our Manager, Ms. Ada Houn, for providing excellent secretarial assistance.

HONORARY AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE COLLEGE OF DENTAL SURGEONS OF HONG KONG

I have audited the financial statements on pages 23 to 34 which have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in Hong Kong.

RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF COUNCILLORS AND THE HONORARY AUDITOR

The Companies Ordinance requires the councillors to prepare financial statements which give a true and fair view. In preparing financial statements which give a true and fair view it is fundamental that appropriate accounting policies are selected and applied consistently.

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. STATUS OF THE COLLEGE

The college was incorporated in Hong Kong on 23rd February, 1993 as a company limited by guarantee. Every member of the college undertakes to contribute, if required, an amount not exceeding HK\$100 to the assets of the college in the event of its being wound up.

The registered office of the college is located at Room 902, HKAM Jockey Club Building, 99 Wong Chuk Hang Road, Aberdeen, Hong Kong,.

The college is engaged in promoting for the public benefit the advancement of knowledge in the field of dental surgery and its associated subjects and promoting training and research in dental surgery.

2. APPLICATION OF HONG KONG FINANCIAL REPORTING STANDARDS ("HKFRSs") / CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES

In the current year, the college has applied, for the first time, a number of new Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards ("HKFRSs"), Hong Kong Accounting Standards ("HKASs") and Interpretation, (herein collectively referred to as the "new HKFRSs") issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants that are effective for accounting periods beginning on or after 1st January, 2005.

The adoption of above-mentioned new/revised HKASs did not result in substantial changes to the college's accounting policies and presentation of the financial statements except the fixed assets are renamed as property, plant and equipment. In addition, cash flow statement had been prepared in accordance with HKAS 7.

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES

a) Basis of preparation:

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all applicable Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards (which includes all applicable Statements of Standard Accounting Practice and Interpretations) issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants, accounting principles generally accepted in Hong Kong and the requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. They have been prepared under historical cost convention.

b) Property, plant and equipment:

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. The cost of an asset comprises its purchase price and any directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use. Expenditure incurred after the property, plant and equipment have been put into operation, such as repairs and maintenance, is normally charged to the income and expenditure account in the period in which it is incurred. In situations where it can be clearly demonstrated that the expenditure has resulted in an increase in the future economic benefits expected to be obtained from the use of the property, plant and equipment, the expenditure is capitalised as an additional cost of that asset.

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is calculated by the straight-line method to allocate cost to their residual value over their estimated useful lives as follows:

College gowns	20% per annum
Leasehold improvement	20% per annum
Furniture and fixtures	20% per annum
Office equipment	20% per annum

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. The gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net sale proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is included in the income statement in the year in which the item is derecognized).

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES (CONT'D)

c) Inventories:

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is calculated by using the weighted average method. Net realizable value is determined by management based on prevailing market conditions.

d) Impairment:

At each balance sheet date, an assessment is made whether there is any indication of impairment of any asset, or whether there is any indication that an impairment loss previously recognised for an asset in prior years may no longer exist or may have decreased. If any such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset or its cash-generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount.

A previously recognised impairment loss is reversed only if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount of an asset, however not to an amount higher than the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of any depreciation), had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years.

e) Revenue recognition:

Income from subscription and entrance fees is recognised on an accruals basis.

 $Income from \, meeting, course \, and \, examination \, is \, recognised \, upon \, completion \, of services \, provided.$

Interest income, on an accrual basis using the effective interest method by applying the rate that discounts the estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial assets.

f) Related parties:

For the purposes of these financial statements, parties are considered to be related to the college if the college has the ability, directly or indirectly, to control the party or exercises ignificant influence over the party in making financial and operating decisions, or vice versa, or where the college and the party are subject to common control or common significant influence. Related parties may be individuals (being members of key management personnel, significant councillors and/or their close family members) or other entities and include entities which are under the significant influence of related parties of the college where those parties are individuals and post-employment benefit plans which are for the benefit of employees of the college or of any entity that is a related party of the college.

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES (CONT'D)

g) Cash and cash equivalents:

For the purpose of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and demand deposits, and short term highly liquid investments which are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and have a short maturity of generally within three months when acquired, less bank overdrafts which are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the college's cash management.

h) Retirement benefit costs:

The company operates a defined contribution retirement scheme under the Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes Ordinance (the "MPF Scheme") for those employees of the college.

The company's contributions to the MPF Scheme are made based on a percentage of the eligible employees' relevant income as defined in the Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes Ordinance. These contributions are expensed as incurred. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the college in independently administered funds.

i) Held-to-maturity financial assets:

Debt securities that the college has the positive ability and intention to hold to maturity are classified as held-to-maturity financial assets. Held-to-maturity financial assets are initially recognised in the balance sheet at fair value plus transaction costs. Subsequently, they are stated in the balance sheet at amortised cost less impairment losses.

12. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The main risks arising from the college's financial instruments are credit risk and liquidity risk. The college does not have any written risk management policies and guidelines. However, the council meet periodically to analyse and formulate measures to manage the college's exposure to these risks. Generally, the college introduces conservative strategies on its risk management. As the college's exposure to these risks is kept to a minimum, the college has not used any derivatives and other instruments for hedging purposes. The college does not hold or issue derivative financial instruments for trading purposes. The councillors review and agree policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarized as follows:

a) Credit risk

The maximum exposure to credit risk in the event that the counterparties fail to perform their obligations as at 31st March, 2006 in relation to each class of recognised financial assets is the carrying amount of those assets as stated in the balance sheet. In order to minimize the credit risk, the councillors has established monitoring procedures to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover the debts. In addition, the college reviews the recoverable amount of each individual account receivable at each balance sheet date to ensure that adequate impairment losses are made for irrecoverable amounts. In this regard, the councillors consider that the college's credit risk is significantly reduced.

The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with sound credit ratings.

b) Liquidity risk

Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient cash. The college aims to maintain flexibility in funding by keeping adequate liquid cash available.

c) Fair value:

The fair values of the following financial assets and financial liabilities are considered to be the same as the carrying amounts because of short term maturity of those financial instruments: cash and bank balances, subscription receivable, interest receivable, prepayments, accrued expenses and receipts in advance.
