This not only promotes lifelong learning but also supports maintaining the high standards expected of Fellows and members of our College.

As leaders in dental excellence, it is our responsibility to harness these technological advancements in a responsible and ethical manner. I encourage all members to stay informed about emerging AI tools and to consider how they can be integrated into our training programs and practice to benefit our patients and the profession as a whole.

Over the past few months, several significant events have occurred. In late June, I had the pleasure of joining the HKAM in welcoming the new Young Fellow Chapter Fellows, including Professor LAM Pui Ying Phoebe, the new Vice Chair of the Young Fellow Chapter. In late August, a convoy of thirteen representatives, including HKAM President Professor LI Philip Kam Tao, Vice President Professor THAM Chee Yung Clement, Honorary Treasurer Professor TSE Eric Wai Choi, Honorary Secretary Dr LEUNG Wing Cheong, Editor Professor WONG Martin Chi Sang, and six College representatives, including myself and the HKAM Secretariat, attended the 58th Malaysia-Singapore Congress of Medicine 2025, which was themed 'Emergency Medicine,' in which Al-aided medical education and training also assumed a prominent presence.



CDSHK Scientific Meeting 2025: Future of Dentistry

Building upon last year's success in Geriatric Dentistry, this year's meeting propelled the profession forward with two days of in-depth discussions, hands-on learning, and collaborative visioning. The Scientific Meeting was held on 26-27 July 2025 at the Academy of Medicine, centered on three transformative themes—advances in technology, specialist education, and young fellows' perspectives—the event united local and international experts to chart dentistry's evolving landscape.

Keynote Highlights: Visionary Insights from Our Speakers

- 1. Transformative Technologies in Clinical Practice
 - Professor Dr Med. Dent. Thomas CONNERT (Endodontics) unveiled cutting-edge advancements in minimally invasive techniques, demonstrating how Al and 3D imaging are redefining precision in root canal therapy.



Dr LUI Chun Tat (Censor-in-chief, The Hong Kong College of Emergency Medicine) showcased the
application of technology in medical education and how the rapid advancement of AI and immersive
technologies is revolutionizing medical education, enabling risk-free simulations for complex procedures
while creating personalized learning experiences. Besides, challenges like implementation costs and
standardization must still be addressed.



• **Dr HO Cheuk Hin (Orthodontics)** shared the new protocol in digital workflows, from Al-driven treatment planning to customized appliances, emphasizing precision and patient-centric care.



2. The Evolution of Specialist Training

Dr SO Hing Yu (Educationist, The Hong Kong Academy of Medicine) shared that while traditional
behaviorist methods have long served medical education, this interactive presentation outlines why
modern medicine demands a more dynamic approach. By embracing learner-centered principles—like
psychological safety, reflective practice, and autonomy-supportive mentoring—we can better cultivate
clinicians who are not only technically skilled but also resilient, adaptable, and intrinsically motivated to
excel in today's complex healthcare environment.



 Dr HO Fu Tak (Education Facilitator, CDSHK) has outlined the effort of the CDSHK to embrace Competency-Based Medical Education (CBME), shifting from knowledge-focused training to continuous assessment of clinical skills, communication, and professionalism. Through the College Retreat and various training programs, the College is ensuring up-to-date curriculum in specialist training to meet evolving patient needs while adapting curricula based on real-world feedback.



• Dr CHENG Hung Wai Ronald (Chairman of the Specialty Board in Periodontology), Dr Cho Hwei Julianna (Chairperson of the Specialty **Board in Oral and Maxillofacial** Surgery) and Dr WONG Tsz Leung (Chairman the Specialty **Board** in Prosthodontist) outlined the training reformed pathway, sparking dialogue on balancing core competencies with emerging skills with different scope and interdisciplinary collaboration. The panel discussion together with Dr SO Hing Yu and Dr HO Fu Tak debated the future of training during an interactive forum, with attendees contributing to a lively exchange on the demand for trainers and the structure of the curriculum.





3. Young Fellows' Global Perspectives

Dr George WRIGHT (Deputy Dental Director, MPS) empowered young dentists to build successful
careers through dentolegal awareness, showing how effective communication and documentation
enhance patient trust and risk management. Using real-world cases, Dr WRIGHT demonstrated how
proactive strategies create resilient practices in today's evolving dental landscape.



• **Dr LIU Hin Nam (Periodontology)** explored the similarities and differences between periodontal education in Hong Kong and London. He compared curriculum, clinical training, and professional pathways to see how each system prepares students for the field's evolving demands.



 Dr YUEN Ha Ching (Prosthodontics) highlighted the role of cultural adaptability in clinical practice, drawing from their fellowship in USA. Through this immersive experience, she was grateful to observe advanced techniques in complex rehabilitations and digital dentistry, gaining invaluable insights that will enhance her patient care.



Dr FOK Tat Chuen and Dr HO Ka Leong (Periodontology) focused on the modern, individualized
management of the most advanced forms of periodontitis (Stages III & IV) in the presentation, which is
based on the updated 2018 AAP/EFP classification. They illustrated these principles through clinical
cases, discussing tailored treatment strategies that integrate conventional and advanced therapies to
address complex tooth loss and improve patient outcomes.



Hands-On Workshops: Elevating Clinical Excellence

Crafting Superior Direct Composite Resin Veneers: A Comprehensive Guide: This workshop
explored the art and science of creating beautiful, durable, and minimally invasive direct composite
veneers. With advancements in materials and techniques, these restorations now offer a highly
predictable way to meet soaring patient expectations for aesthetics and function. Participants refined
aesthetic techniques under the guidance of Professor LIM Tong Wah and Dr LEE Tse Kwan, Louisa,
leveraging layered composite artistry.





Technical Tips and Tricks of Surgical Wound Closure-Intermediate Course: The immersive training
on complex closures, incorporating biomaterials and tension-free approaches was led by Dr SO Cheuk
Hang, Dr LAW Yee Hung and Dr HO King Lun. Through hands-on practice, this workshop provided the
essential skills to optimize wound management, enhance healing, and achieve superior, predictable
outcomes in some challenging cases.



Advanced Interdisciplinary Digital Strategies: When Orthodontics Meets Prosthodontic Dentistry:
 A debut workshop co-led by Professor LAM Yu Hang and Dr LAU Yun Wah. This hands-on workshop explored how to integrate cutting-edge digital technologies for orthodontic and prosthodontic treatments, emphasizing interdisciplinary collaboration for superior results. Participants gained practical experience in digital smile design, treatment simulation, and using advanced software and 3D printing to fabricate customized occlusal splints for managing TMD.

Our Fellows Contribution in HKAM

It all started from March 2018, upon the retirement of late Professor Stephen WAI. I was nominated by the incumbent president of College of Dental Surgeons Dr Robert NG to succeed Professor WAI as member of House Committee of Academy of Medicine.

The Committee is chaired by the incumbent Honorary Secretary of Academy Council with Honorary Treasurer and President as Ex officio members followed by up to 11 other members from representatives of constituent colleges or administrators from private and public hospitals. These members are nominated by House Committee Chairman and appointed by Academy Council for a term of 2 years. House Committee holds regular meetings quarterly every year.

The terms of reference of House Committee are:

- 1. To provide membership service in relation to accommodation amenities and supporting services.
- 2. To determine the rules governing the usage of premises and implement those rules.
- 3. To oversees the management of employees of the Academy.

Accordingly, the regular discussion items of the meeting cover membership services involving well-being of members, arranging social functions for members and catering services; estate management including Information Technology and facilities management and human resources management of Academy Secretariat. To improve the efficiency of the House Committee, various subcommittees were formed namely Human Resources Subcommittee, Social Subcommittee, Task force on well-being and Information Technology Subcommittee which will hold regular meetings to resolve specific matters and forward their recommendations during the quarterly meeting.

Human Resources Subcommittee

The day to day running of the Academy depends very much on our efficient secretariat staff. The organizational structure of the Secretariat is reviewed regularly by the Officers and Human Resources Subcommittee to ensure the level of support and expertise are adequate in helping the Academy achieve its goals and statutory objectives. Policies and house-rules have also been updated to fulfill new legislative requirements, improve labour relations, as well as streamline workflow. With the statutory role of the Academy becoming increasingly important in Hong Kong, and the scope of work continuing to expand due to various needs, the Academy must maintain a strong healthy workforce to handle different tasks and additional responsibilities. The Secretariat has a total of around 50 staff members serving various functions such as providing administrative support for the Council and various committees, maintaining CME / CPD records for over 8,600 Fellows, publishing indexed journals to facilitate research dissemination and enable knowledge advancement, offering event and technical support to the 15 constituent Colleges, as well as overseeing facility management and operations of catering services in the 10-storey Academy Building with multi-purpose facilities.

Information Technology Subcommittee

The Subcommittee takes care of the development and maintenance of the infrastructure of information technology of the Academy Colleges. The Information Technology (IT) team developed a new e-Portfolio System, providing a convenient platform to Academy Colleges and nominees to submit Fellowship nomination, settle payment and trace the vetting process online via the system.

They also launched a comprehensive information management system in October 2022, namely 'eHKAM'. It consisted of several applications, such as a new Fellows' Portal, a newly developed online learning management system and the existing International Network for Continuing Medical Education and Continuous Professional Development (iCMECPD). The online learning management system will provide e-learning resources and delivers virtual learning solutions, which will gradually replace the existing e-learning function provided on the iCMECPD. By the end of 2023, a new comprehensive mobile application, namely 'eHKAM App', was launched to replace the 'iCMECPD App' which has been in use for many years. The 'eHKAM App' will include various features exclusively designed for Fellows, such as electronic fellowship card, event attendance management, personal profile management, and electronic coupon. The mobile application will serve as one of the communication channels between Academy and Fellows, and provide information on various activities, allowing Fellows to stay tuned on the latest news and developments of the Academy anytime, anywhere.

Furthermore, eHKAM was enhanced with the Single Sign-On (SSO) technology. With the use of SSO technology, Fellows will be able to access multiple applications on the eHKAM conveniently through authentication one time only. A dedicated email address will be provided to Academy Fellows who registered for an eHKAM account for personal use.

In addition the Subcommittee also manages the audiovisual hardware upgrade of the Academy. Several enhancement initiatives on audio-visual and information technology were carried out including the building of Digital Production Studio inside the Leung Kau Kui Medical Library on the third floor of the Academy Building. The Studio is equipped with state-of-the-art device setup and facilities for video shooting and live event production, easing online learning conducted by the Academy and its constituent Colleges.

Social Subcommittee

The Social Subcommittee has made continuous efforts to enhance member services to Fellows. The purpose for networking is to enhance cohesion amongst Fellows and strengthen sense of belonging to the Academy. Enriched dining experience was offered across the year. Yum Cha is still one of the Academy's most popular events, particularly on Mother's Day and Father's Day. A wide variety of classic dishes and snacks of Hong Kong were served. Fellows can also enjoy access to the Academy Lounge, which is ideal for private functions. The programme 'Friends of Academy Gardening Corner', which was launched in 2021, received overwhelming response from Fellows who enjoy organic gardening and the produce they harvested. If you enjoy sports there is annual intercollegiate basket-ball tournament and Golf Day, or you can join the recently formed HKAM football team. Exclusive offers on goods and services were solicited for Fellows, including discounted festive delicacies of Chinese New Year, Dragon Boat Festival and Mid-Autumn Festival, hotels' accommodation and dining privileges, mobile telecommunication services, etc. Various updates on membership services were disseminated through eblasts, which were also published on the Academy's website.

Task Force on Well-being

In response to the alarming result of the well-being study conducted by the Young Fellows Chapter in 2019, Professor Gilberto LEUNG briefed members on the need for the Academy to address the burnout issues encountered by Academy Fellows and trainees. A Task Force on Well-being was set up under House Committee. The Academy has been persistently advocating doctors' well-being through an 'ASAP approach' – Awareness, Self-care, Ask for help and Promotion of well-being. The Task Force on Well-being continued its initiatives to raise awareness of different levels of work related burnout through the 'Copenhagen Burnout Inventory' questionnaire. By continuing to recruit Peer Supporters, the Academy built a strong network and connection to offer unofficial psychological support to Fellows and specialist trainees in need across different specialties. As quality patient care and doctors' well-being go hand in hand. The Academy, assuming a leading role in the medical and dental profession, has promulgated a Well-being Charter committed to cultivating and promoting well-being of Academy Fellows and specialist trainees of its constituent Colleges. The designated webpage to promote doctors' well-being (well-being.hkam.org.hk) continues to provide useful resources and information.

Estate Management

Through these years, 3 property management companies had been appointed after careful tendering process scrutinized by House Committee to take care of our Academy Building, namely ISS Facility Services (2018-2019), Savills (2020-2022), ISS East Point Property Management Ltd. (2023-2025).

In 2019, a major project for the Academy building was the external wall refurbishment works, which would be conducted in 2 phases. The first phase of works (mainly on the external wall of Run Run Shaw Hall facing Wong Chuk Hang Road) commenced in April and was duly completed in August with a refreshing new look. Works for the second phase began in January and completed in June 2020.

Other maintenance works continued including the installation of infrared sensor safety edge system for all the lifts to improve operational safety, the installation of additional CCTV surveillance cameras at the LG/F car park for better monitoring and security reasons as well as repair works for damages of facilities caused by Typhoon Mangkhut in 2018.

To ensure occupational health and well-being of staff working within the building, the Academy participated in the Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) certification scheme under the IAQ Information Centre of Environmental Protection Department. The inspection of air quality was done in June 2019 and a "Good Class" certificate was awarded.

Some basic renovation works for the vacant units of the Academy's Archives Office at Hing Wai Industrial Centre was completed in 2019 to provide more storage spaces for the Academy and Colleges.

In 2024, the Academy Building also went through a 5-yearly inspection to test the Fixed Electrical Installation as well as comprehensive waterproofing works on the roof top of the Run Run Shaw Hall to ensure activities to be held inside would not be affected by extreme weather conditions. Additionally, the Academy started to install electric vehicle charging stations at its carpark to support sustainable transportation and reduce carbon footprint.

Event Team

The Event Team of the Secretariat has continued to promote Academy's venues by approaching different potential clients including other professional bodies, and work closely with the Hong Kong Tourism Board to build up linkage with overseas event organisers. Several international conferences were held at the Academy building as a result of the marketing efforts. Meanwhile, the Booking policy for other organisations was relaxed for bookings during non-peak months. Bookings from the Academy or Colleges remain top priorities. The Event Team continued to assist the Academy, its Hong Kong Jockey Club Disaster Preparedness and Response Institute (HKJCDPRI) and Hong Kong Jockey Club Innovative Learning Centre for Medicine (HKJC ILCM) as well as Colleges to organize events or provide secretariat and on-site support to their events.

As a member of House Committee, our duties is to uphold membership services to enhance our coherence and oversee various management parties for proper maintenance of the Academy buildings and promote the Academy facilities as venue for events of our constituent colleges and other international institutions. However, the effective execution of our proposals depends very much on the hard-work of our effective Secretariat Staff and Properties Management Staff. Being a member, I gradually widen my scope of interest from being a representative of College of Dental Surgeons to a representative of Academy of Medicine.

Our Fellows Contribution in HKAM

The Young Fellows Chapter (YFC) was established by the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine with the aim of nurturing future healthcare leaders. Membership in the YFC comprises two young fellows from each of the 15 Academic Colleges. YFC council members have the opportunity to participate in various events and activities organized by the Academy. Additionally, they are invited to join different HKAM subcommittees and working groups to better understand HKAM's objectives and to support the Academy in achieving its goals. YFC members were also given the opportunity to participate in exchange programs and international travel to learn about healthcare systems and developments in various regions of China.

This year, Professor LAM Pui Ying Phoebe and Dr WONG Kaye Wing Sze, young fellows from Paediatric Dentistry and Community Dentistry respectively, have been selected as the 2025-26 YFC representatives from the College of Dental Surgeons of Hong Kong. Professor LAM serves as the YFC vice-chairperson and is a representative on the HKAM Research Subcommittee, as well as eLearning and Technology Subcommittee. Dr WONG serves as the honorary treasurer and is a member of the HKAM Professionalism and Ethics Committee. They are supporting HKAM in organizing and coordinating various conferences and occasional events, including the upcoming Academy Medical Education Conference in September 2025, as well as social events to foster fellowship and community among members.
